NAVAJO/PUEBLO CONSOLIDATION

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<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Do it → ditto• Move Ed Center as soon as you can afford• Kiva K-8 — get those guys on your side• Agree to move Ed Center as quickly as possible• Too many schools on the Granite Reef corridor• No empty campus left in a neighborhood, built to fit on new neutral campus	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Not at Mohave, on Navajo site• No Mohave 6-7-8, lose the 6 — same with Supai• Where do Mohave students go when Pueblo/Navajo construction begins??• Pueblo/Navajo becomes “super school (more students than any other elementary school in complex)• Needs \$

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ISSUES/CONCERNS

- Continue to be concerned about K-8 versus middle schools. Are middle schools providing the programs that were originally intended? Have the desire of the families been thoroughly asked?
- Why the sudden focus on K-5? How does shifting a grade from one building to another save money?? Shouldn't we be looking at consolidation as opposed to making campuses smaller? Go K-8 throughout the complex, eliminate the middle schools.
- My wife doesn't like K-5. What's worth more on the backside, Supai land or Tonalea land
- Great work has already been done. Stick with the September proposal.

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NEW IDEAS

- Re-clarify the vision/direction of the facility plan with regard to the Coronado Complex
- Continue to monitor student population
- Evaluate SUSD's flow of middle school students from elementary school — how can we keep these students in our district?
- Make a decision. Ideas should now focus on doing what's best for kids within the scope of the new plan.
- SUSD district-wide complex specific survey
- Exit interviews — why are students leaving SUSD? (i.e. middle school)
- Traditional focus at Supai

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CORONADO CONSOLIDATION IDEAS

- No closure for Coronado Complex
- If closure must occur, we stand by original recommendation to have Board select which elementary school to close and redraw boundaries
- Hohokam Traditional
- Reduce Tavan overload by changing west of 68th to Tonalea as home school
- Agree with the above statement but we need to examine the boundaries as they stand now
- Continue to look at Coronado Complex schools for “right-sizing” options
- K-8 throughout Coronado Complex; eliminate middle school!
- Too many schools along Granite Reef!!
- Rebuild Tonalea first. Move Supai to Tonalea — during rebuild only!
- Have Coronado Complex return to K-8 configuration. Phase out middle school with zero student displacement.
- Close a school so that two schools don’t compete for same kids
- Change Kiva boundaries to promote Pima and Hohokam traditional
- Offer choice; advertise choice, bringing out-of-district students into SUSD
 - Hohokam K-8 traditional
 - Pima K-8
 - Yavapai K-5
 - Tonalea K-5
 - Supai 6-7-8
- Market success to increase enrollment
- 1 K-8/complex → Hohokam

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ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS

- Continue to monitor student populations — open enrollment within the district; open enrollment outside the district (guidelines/procedures for in-district open enrollment)
- What student population trends are we seeing due to economy factors, housing availability and budget (district)?
- When can we expect the Board to hear the Coronado recommendations?
- How much money actually needs to be cut from the budget??
- When will we have answers? (state budget)
- Will we be going through this process again next year??
- Can we go the state for more money for Special Ed?
- Will the facility numbers change again?
- Are boundary changes being considered? Kiva? Tavan?
- Can we see historical capacity numbers for schools, i.e. Aztec 900+ in late 90s
- Lots of talk floated around last year about condo conversions affecting enrollment adversely. With the recent increase in home foreclosures and people being forced into apartments, what effect will this trend have on enrollment down south?
